

Throw Net

Materials:

Weighted Hula Hoop (Amazon)

Netting (Pond netting or pheasant netting)

Camouflage Duct or Gaffer Tape

Duct tape leave a sticky residue once removed, Gaffer tape does not)

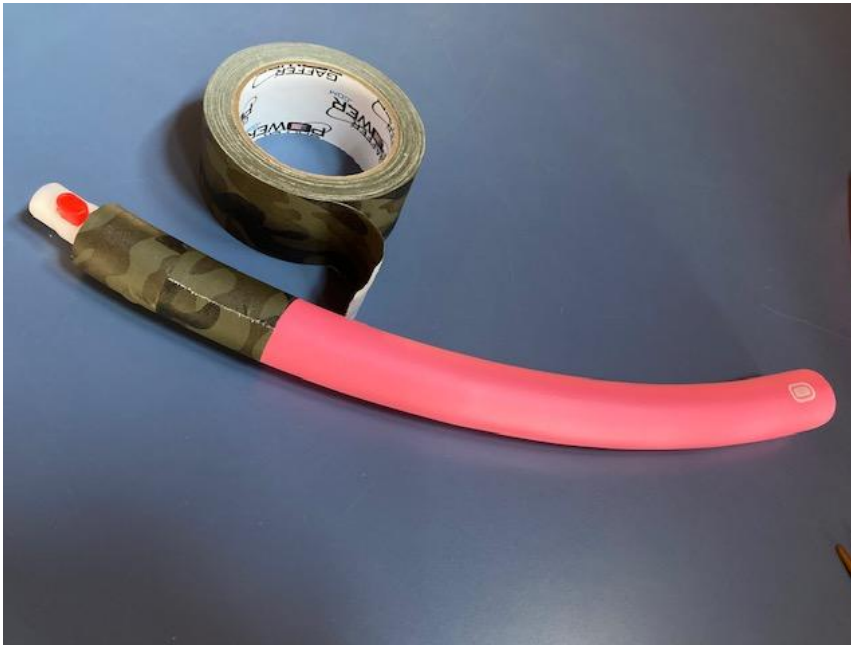
4" zip ties

Tools needed:

Scissors (cut netting)

Wire cutters (cut zip toes)

Needle nose pliers (tighten zip ties)



Cover Hula Hoop that is not a natural color with Camouflage tape

If Hula Hoop came in sections, snap each section securely together



Place two plastic containers on surface and cover with netting. Then place Hula Hoop over both. Once the netting is evenly distributed, cut netting 3 inches from the outside of the hoop.



Begin securing the zip ties by attaching the netting on the outside, pulling over the hoop, and attaching to the netting on the inside at four evenly spaced places on the hoop. Then zip tie netting in between the four original secured zip ties. Then repeat the same process between those zip ties. Continue working around the hoop until netting is attached.

Cut the zip ties as close to the locking head as possible.



To turn into a pull-down net, put paracord or string at top of hula hoop and let drop to ground. Pull the cord/string quickly when the waterfowl is not looking in your direction. Once waterfowl is covered with the throw net, run to the net and secure it so the waterfowl does not escape.
